Mary passed away in her sleep at the age of 90 of Alzheimer's disease. Mary graduated from VGH School of Nursing as a registered nurse in 1947 and worked at hospitals in San Francisco, New Orleans and New York before settling back at VGH. In April 1951 Mary attended a military ball where she met Cedric and they were engaged five weeks later and on November 2, 1951 they were married and lived 64 years of love and adventure. Mary worked for six years at Vancouver General Hospital where she was head nurse on the research and medical ward. She enjoyed her work immensely but was glad to become a stay at home Mother in 1960. Cedric and Mary lived in Saudi Arabia and Japan after they raised their children and they traveled extensively while living overseas. During her retirement, Mary volunteered at the Langley library and Fort Langley Museum where she made many good friends. She loved to play bridge and golf and she was an avid reader. Mary will be forever loved and always remembered for her love of life and family, enormous strength of will, sense of adventure, love of animals, intelligence and humour. She is sorely missed.
